1 INTRODUCTION

A public meeting for the Florida Avenue Project Environmental Assessment (EA) was held at St. David Catholic School Gymnasium, 1230 Lamanche Street, New Orleans, LA 70117 on Thursday, September 8, 2016. The meeting was held from 4:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. and was open to the public. An officials meeting was held from 3:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. on the same day.

This document provides copies of the public meeting materials, sign-in sheets, and a summary of the September 8, 2016 meeting events. Comments received from the date of the public meeting through the close of the comment period on September 28, 2016, are provided.

2 MEETING NOTIFICATION

A public meeting notice was published in *The New Orleans Advocate* on August 24, 2016, *Louisiana Weekly* on August 29, 2016, *The Times-Picayune* on August 31, 2016 and *The* St. Bernard Voice on September 2, 2016. The advertised copies of the meeting notice are provided in Appendix A.

Local media was informed about the meeting via press release. A public service announcement was also issued to local radio stations. The press release, public service announcement and media list are provided in Appendix B.

The Louisiana Department of Transportation and Development (LADOTD) posted the meeting notice on the project webpage http://wwwapps.dotd.la.gov/administration/public_info/projects/home.aspx?key=97. The meeting notice was mailed and/or emailed to the state and parish Solicitation of Views list, which included state and parish elected officials and agency representatives. The meeting notice was issued via mail and/or door hanger to residences, businesses, and churches within the immediate vicinity of the project corridor. As an extension of the outreach effort, the churches were provided with flyers containing the meeting notice for distribution to their congregations. In addition, the meeting notice was issued via email to multiple neighborhood organizations for distribution to their members. A sample of the public meeting notice and copy of the mail/email distribution lists are provided in Appendix C.

3 MEETING EVENTS

The officials meeting preceded the public meeting, which provided them an opportunity to preview the current materials and displays related to the EA process for the project. LADOTD representatives and members of the consultant team were available to discuss the project and answer questions in preparation for the public meeting.

The meeting was organized in an informal, open-house format. The purpose of the meeting was to present an overview of the proposed project and provide an opportunity to obtain comments. Graphic displays included the study area, typical sections, alternatives, existing travel patterns, design challenges, Caffin Park rendering, build rendering, and bridge matrix. Attendees received the following handouts: a comment form, fact sheet, study area map, and a sheet highlighting design challenges. Attendees also obtained information informally from LADOTD representatives, the consultant team, and exhibits displayed at the meeting. A copy of the comment form and handouts are provided in Appendix D.

The exhibits were displayed around the meeting room and additional copies were placed on tabletops as an alternate viewing option. The exhibits are provided on the project webpage http://www.apps.dotd.la.gov/administration/public info/projects/home.aspx?key=97.

4 MEETING ATTENDANCE

A total of 119 persons registered their attendance on the sign-in sheets. Of these persons, 88 were members of the public, 12 were elected officials or their representatives, and 19 were members of the project consultant team. Copies of the sign-in sheets are provided in Appendix F.

5 COMMENTS

The public was offered two opportunities for submitting their comments for the record during the public meeting. A comment form was provided with the meeting handouts (Appendix D) and a transcriber was available during the course of the meeting to record verbal comments. Written comments received via U.S. mail and postmarked by the close of the comment period, which was established as September 28, 2016, are provided in Appendix G. Comments received by electronic mail through the close of the comment period are also provided in Appendix G. A copy of the transcript of verbal comments and transcript certification is provided in Appendix H.

Some attendees provided informal comments and/or asked questions of project team members during the meeting. Most of these comments, which are provided below, were also repeated to the transcriber, written on the comment forms, or sent by email.

- How tall is the fixed bridge?

- Are we having another meeting in St. Bernard Parish too? If not, why?
- Why isn't this meeting at Delgado instead of this location?
- Why isn't this meeting in the Desire neighborhood; will there be another meeting for New Orleans Residents?
- Where will the next meeting be held?
- This is a lot of information for people to understand. Comments would be more meaningful if people had more time to understand this information.

- Who owns Arcadis, who are you really working for?
- Where's the rest of the citizens, why wasn't everyone invited?
- Written comments is a literacy test. You're not accepting comments from everyone.

- What website can I go to view these materials later?
- Where are the 1985, 2007, and Stage 0 studies located on the DOTD website?

Funding

- Why are the residents of this area bearing the burden of improvement again after all they've lost in Katrina?
- The Meraux Foundation is willing to donate land along the middle, blue N-S Phase 4 option, but not forever and with condition that the Benjamin Street region be avoided by an alignment that loops around it with an alignment in the Central wetlands (approx. 1 mile).
- Why an expensive project like this being proposed when there is has been so little done to bring back the region since Katrina?
- Why wasn't this built immediately after Katrina, why wait until everyone is settled and most of the neighborhood rebuilt?
- Does this project have funding?
- Are private dollars funding this project? This project is probably funded by the O&G (i.e. oil and gas) industry as residents will not benefit from these improvements.

Alternatives

- Why can't improvements be made adjacent to the Barracks property instead of along Tupelo?
- Why can't this project end at the blue, middle N-S Phase 4 alignment instead of extending to Paris?
- Paris Road should be the location for the N-S improvements as its commercial; it should be improved in a way to continue widening it as the major corridor in the future.
- The proposed connections from the new bridge to Elysian Fields and Paris Road only seem to serve large industrial traffic. Would be most in favor of restricting large trucks to Paris Road up to I-510 to get out of St. Bernard Parish rather than encouraging them to proceed through pedestrian and bicycle-friendly neighborhoods. Personal cars will use the new bridge regardless of these "faster" connections.
- We need "2 bridges" but no Florida avenue improvements.
- Adding additional traffic to Elysian Fields is not a good idea. Elysian Fields is already heavily congested.
- How will you cross the tracks at Oliver Yard? It needs to be an overpass.
- Almonaster Drive is heavily traveled so that should remain, what about an elevated roundabout similar to the one at Causeway and Airline?
- Is it possible to connect the proposed project directly to I-10 rather than having to connect via Elysian Fields, with the hope that this would alleviate some traffic congestion on Elysian Fields?

- There is an effort underway in St. Bernard Parish to develop the former school bus barn into a railroad siding/transfer facility. Would be possible to tie that facility directly to the proposed project to increase connectivity?
- Can there be a turning point into the neighborhood closer than Tupelo (i.e. Caffin)?

Constraints

- Tupelo Street was built above a canal in the early '70s, is above a hollow culvert and not built to withstand heavy truck traffic.
- The red, westernmost N-S Phase 4 option impacts planned residential development and is in conflict with St. Bernard Parish efforts.
- The City has an ordinance that does not allow the RR tracks to be blocked for more than 5 minutes, so RR closures should not be as great of a problem as noted.
- The region has done so much to bring the Central Wetlands back that we want to make sure that this project does not impact that progress.
- Will the vehicle emissions affect the wildlife in the canal?
- Conflict with St. Bernard Parish efforts to market the area for development / growth.
- What can be done to incorporate sustainable drainage into this project? (bioswales and raingardens) This region has a problem with street flooding and subsidence. More needs to be done than simply pumping water off the streets.
- The proposed lock will be a deep draft facility, will the new bridge consider that?
- The IHNC is going to be widened, are you aware of that?
- How can this project just wipe out established neighborhoods? (St. Bernard Parish)
- Why are African Americans with a lower income the ones being pushed from their homes yet again? (Lower Ninth Ward, Orleans Parish)

Governor asks Obama for wide range of flood relief

Gov. John Bel Edwards asked President Barack Obama for a wide range of flood relief Tuesday, including having the federal government pick up a larger than normal share of recovery costs, dollars to construct the Comite River Diversion Project and assistance for battered homeowners who lacked flood insurance.

'While we do not doubt the ability of our citizens to recover, we need the help of the federal government," Edwards said in a four-page letter to Obama, who toured flooded areas in Zachary to get a firsthand view of the flood of 2016.

The governor said the flood, combined with other problems, is testing our spirit in ways we have not seen since the challenges posed by Hurricane Katrina.

In his message to the president, Edwards asked that Louisiana be relieved from the requirement that it pay for 25 percent of repair costs.

He said well over 100,000 homes were damaged or destroyed and that in March more than 29,000 homes were damaged or destroyed in flooding in north Louisiana, as well as damages to public roads, buildings and bridges.

"I therefore ask you to reduce Louisiana's cost share from 25 percent to 10 percent,"

Edwards said in his letter. In another area, the governor said the Comite River Diversion Project was authorized in 1994, and residents have paid taxes for it for nearly 20 years.

If it had been in operation, Edwards said, a significant portion of water from the Comite River would have been diverted to the Mississippi River "and away from homes and businesses in East Feliciana, St. Helena, East Baton Rouge and Livingston

U.S. Army Corps of Engineers for the federal share of the project, which already has won congressional authorization.

In a third area, Edwards requested block grant disaster recovery dollars be included in the president's supplemental budget request to Congress since many homeowners lacked flood insurance, or were not required to carry it.

Without such assistance, he said, "many neighborhoods and communities will not be able to recover.

After touring damaged homes, Obama noted to reporters that lots of damaged residences lacked flood insurance.

He said what FEMA Administrator Craig Fugate is doing, and been instructed to do, "is let's get the money out as fast as we can.

"Because we know that there's going to be a certain amount of assistance that's going to be forthcoming, so there's tributed to this report.

Interested parties are hereby notified that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has prepared a draft Environmental Assessment (EA) and draft Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) in compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). The purpose of the EA is to assess the effects on the human and natural environment for the St Bernard Basin Back Levee Extension project, which proposes to realign a portion of the back basin levee along Violet Canal and improve drainage through design reconfiguration in an effort to have the back basin levee incorporated into the federal hurricane protection system and included in the forthcoming Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) for St. Bernard and Orleans parishes.

In an effort to reduce flooding, National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) claims, and NFIP participation costs for residents, Southeast Louisiana Flood Protection Authority - East is working to get the Back Protection Levee System (BPLS) incorporated into the federal hurricane protection system and included in the forthcoming FIRM for St. Bernard and Orleans parishes. As part of the evaluation of the BLPS and the 40 Arpent Levee system, it was determined that the Violet Canal North Bank required improvements to meet the FEMA NFIP regulations (44 CFR 65.10) for 100-year level flood protection.

The purpose of the draft EA is to analyze the potential environmental impacts associated with the preferred action and alternatives. The draft EA evaluates a No Action Alternative, the Preferred Action Alternative, which would realign a portion of the back basin levee along Violet Canal and improve drainage through design reconfiguration, and a Considered Action Alternative which would construct a 1,375 linear foot sheet pile wall along the interior of the Violet Canal stretch. The draft FONSI is FEMA's finding that the preferred action would not have a significant effect on the human and natural environment.

Study calls for reduction in Orleans jail population

A detailed study on precisely who is in jail in New Orleans shows significant progress in the city's history of excessive incarceration rates, but also advocates for a further reduction in the jail population and a broader conversation asking, "How well is our system working?"

The report released this month by the Vera Institute of Justice is titled "New Orleans: Who's in Jail and Why," and gives a breakdown of the demographics and justifications of the jailed population between April 2015 and March 2016.

More than a decade ago, New Orleans jailed people at a rate five times the national average, but today the population of Orleans Parish Prison (OPP) has consistently decreased since 2009, according to the report. In that same time period, "local crime rates decrease, demonstrating that the jail population can be reduced safely."

In the year Vera documented the population, there was a 15 percent decrease, from 1,876 people to 1,591 people. But with the recent opening of the new jail, the report concludes the capacity outweighs the needs: "With 2,039 beds available and an average daily population of fewer than 1,600 people, the number of jail beds exceeds our current detention needs.'

jail stay can be far reaching, the report described, of the city's historically high incarceration rates and the "tens of thousands of people booked into the jail each year who lost their jobs, homes, and even custody of their children. Instead of making us the safest city in America, the over-use of detention destabilized communities."

If Louisiana has any lessons for the rest of the nation, it has shown without doubt that locking more people up does not result in lower crimes rates.

Defining the purpose of jail, the Vera report notes that unlike prisons, jails are designed for short-term use, and "The city of New Orleans pays for the operation of the jail with taxpayers' dollars; it is a core civic responsibility to ensure that we detain people only when necessary."

On March 2, 2016, the survey found 90 percent of people in jail were waiting on a court date and not serving a sentence. Only 10 percent of the population in OPP on that day included people convicted of a crime and serving a sentence. "An arrest does not prove that someone committed a crime," the report observes, "which is why we need tools in addition to the charge used at the time of arrest to decide who should be released pending trial."

The report also notes that in Louisiana, even something labeled a "felony," can be as minor as simple

drug possession – which in the case of marijuana is now not even a crime in a growing number of states.

But holding people who pose little or no threat to society is not only unnecessarily destructive to that individual's future and a waste of taxpayer dollars, it is counterproductive, according to Vera: 'Timely release is essential because even a few days in jail for low-risk arrestees increases their chances of being arrested for a new offense while on pretrial release.'

The over-incarceration of Americans is a growing conversation nationwide, and the call for

reform increasingly bi-partisan. On August 18, the U.S. Department of Justice instructed officials in a memo to either decline to renew the contracts for private prison operators when they expire or "substantially reduce" the contracts' scope.

While OPP is not a privately operated prison, a closer examination of the motives behind putting people - especially non-violent offenders - behind bars is increasingly being scrutinized.

The goal in phasing out the use of private prisons on a federal level, U.S. Deputy Attorney General Sally Yates wrote is "reducing and ultimately ending - our use of privately operated prisons. They simply do not provide the same level of correctional services, programs, and resources; they do not save substantially on costs; and as

noted in a recent report by the found. Department's Office of Inspector General, they do not maintain the same level of safety and security."

There are privately operated prisons in many parts of Louisiana, and a depraved system in place which relies on filling the cells so that prison profiteers can fill their pockets

There is also a bigger spotlight on whether some are operating as "debtors' prisons."

In June, the Southern Poverty Law Center (SPLC) filed a federal class-action lawsuit against a Judge Robert Black in Bogalusa, accusing Black of imposing illegal fees and jailing defendants who are unable to pay for traffic tickets and misdemeanors

"Nobody should be jailed or threatened with jail if they are too poor to pay a fine," said SPLC Deputy Legal Director Sam Brooke in a statement. "Funding the justice system on the backs of the poor is fundamentally unfair and creates a systemic incentive to find people guilty."

The Vera report on OPP also looked at the people who may be in jail because they are unable to afford their bond. For those who pose a low or low-moderate risk of failing to appear for future court dates or being arrested for a new offense, "One hundred and eighteen of them were held on a \$25,000 bail or less, an unaffordable sum to many," the report

rate is almost twice the national average. Eighty-five percent of people who go through the criminal justice system are too poor to hire a lawyer."

The study also examined how different populations are disproportionately impacted. Black men were found to be 50 percent more likely than white men to be arrested, and Black women were 55 percent more likely to be arrested than white women. In addition, Black men tended to be held in jail longer, the report found.

"Although black males repre-

sent 28 percent of the entire New Orleans population, black men made up 80 percent of people in OPP on March 2, 2016," according to the report. "What is evident in this data is that the current use of detention disproportionately harms black people in New Orleans."

In conclusion, the report acknowledges the improvement in that New Orleans is no longer leading the nation in incarceration, but also that there remains much room for improvement. More beds are not needed, Vera emphasizes, and there is a need to further reduce the current jail population as well as address the racial disparities.

Ex-Maryland official tapped as Compliance Director of Orleans Parish jail

(AP) - A former Maryland corrections official was tapped last Thursday to run the violence-plagued New Orleans jail.

Gary Maynard will fill the role of "compliance director." Sheriff Marlin Gusman announced the choice in a news release, praising Maynard's four decades of experince. The choice was subject to approval by a federal judge overseeing Gusman's compliance with a 2012 reform agreement.

That agreement settled a lawsuit by inmates and the U.S. Justice Department.

But Gusman's slow progress drew harsh criticism from the plaintiffs and from officials with the city, which funds the jail. Even after inmates were moved from aging facilities to a new jail last year, violence continued and an inmate killed himself.

Mayor Mitch Landrieu's administration

District Judge Lance Africk to take control of the jail away from Gusman. In a compromise in June, Gusman agreed to appoint and cede authority over the jail to a compliance director with broad authority over staffing, management and the jail budget.

Maynard was one of two people recommended for the job by the plaintiffs and the city.

A panel including local criminal justice officials and community leaders also weighed in: "We believe he will be capable of leading the urgent and daunting task of bringing the Orleans Parish jail into Constitutional compliance as expeditiously as possible. Once approved by the Court, we look forward to working with Mr. Maynard to ensure the jail is safe, secure, well-run and right-sized."

tracts," Stalbert stated.

The City of New Orleans will conduct a disparity study to determine the effects that discrimination has had and still has on contracting opportunities and economic activity in the city. A total of \$500,000 was included in the city's 2016 budget, exclusively for the study.

"The City of New Orleans put out a request for proposal and about seven companies responded," Stalbert stated. "There was a committee that was selected by the city to evaluate those proposals and there was specific evaluation criteria set based upon the request for proposal, and the Keen Independent Research was selected because they scored high on all of the different categories of the evaluation," Stalbert added.

According to Stalbert, the firm is a very strong organization and has conducted more than 150 studies. Their studies have been challenged; however, Stalbert said they have ing the study, the firm is responsible for presenting a remedy to address the disparity. Stalbert said the goal is to get "narrowly tailored results" or specific results, to solve the disparities. Past cases in which this variable was missing, resulted in failure to effectively solve issues plaguing communities.

"While the study will be extremely valuable, the real challenge is what we as a community will do to hold folk accountable to making it happen, to create an environment of equity in terms of the economic system," said State Representative Joseph Bouie. As a lesson learned from the last disparity study, which was conducted more than twenty years ago, Dangerfield emphasized the importance of pursuing results after the study is completed. When the data expires, the data is no longer valid. When the last study expired, it was challenged in court, and the data was no longer usable. The city had to change their program from a race-conscious program to a race-neutral program, based on the settlement agree-

ment from the disparity study. While the city has a D Enterprise program (DBE), contract opportunities for minority-owned businesses are scarce. Per the program, 35 percent of contracts from large companies should be contracted to DBE businesses, but this is not materializing. Stalbert stated of the 60 percent African-American population in the city, only two to three percent are getting contracts.



A sobriety check point in Chalmette the night of Aug. 25 resulted in a number of arrests for narcotics possession and driving while intoxicated, as well as the seizure of four weapons, Sheriff James Pohlmann said.

The check point was conducted by the St. Bernard Parish Sheriff's Office, along with the Plaquemines Sheriff's Office and Louisiana State Police.

home sales in a given area and are based on the price per square foot. Turner also reminded residents to report changes of address directly to the assessor's office.

For 2015, the total taxable value—the value taxing bodies use to figure how much money they're receiving from taxpayers—was \$319,923,644. That same figure was \$329,273,390 in 2014 and \$309,866,415 in 2013. The recent decline in total taxable value was largely due to declines in the oil and gas industry. Residential properties, she said, have seen increases during the same period.

The assessor's books are open from Aug. 24 through Sept. 14. Turner encouraged anyone with questions about their assessments to visit her office for help.

To formally appeal an assessment, homeowners must file an appeal with the Parish Council, which in St. Bernard Parish acts at the Board of Review. The deadline to file an appeal with the Clerk of Council is Sept. 19. The Board of Review's findings will then be presented to the state Tax Commission. Following that, a homeowner may file a protest with the Louisiana Tax Commission. All taxpayers in St. Bernard are urged to get with the Assessor's office now with values and questions, waiting until tax bills go out at the end of the year is too late to change the amount owed.




The idea for this project has been around since the early 20th century. The New Orleans 1927 Master Plan included a thoroughfare that extended from West End Blvd. in Orleans Parish to the St. Bernard Parish line.




In 1967 the a Trans City Expressway was evaluated. (CLICK) This thoroughfare extended the proposed route in the 1927 master plan to Paris Road in St. Bernard Parish.

In 1985 (CLICK) a corridor study for the current project termini was completed, which proposed construction of a fixed bridge across the Inner Harbor Navigation Canal or IHNC. Construction of the proposed bridge was originally included in the Transportation Infrastructure Model for Economic Development (TIMED) program created by the Louisiana Legislature in 1989. However, construction of the bridge was later placed on hold by LADOTD due to environmental concerns surrounding the project and the need for further studies.



In 2003 the project resumed with an Environmental Assessment that is completed for all federal actions or funded projects. It was completed in 2005, and amended in 2007. (CLICK) The 2007 environmental assessment focused on the bridge over the IHNC. Connections to Florida Avenue were considered secondary features.




In 2013, (CLICK) LADOTD revisited the project to identify cost saving opportunities. The alternative from 2007, which included an elevated section through the central wetlands, north of the 40 Arpent Canal in St. Bernard Parish was reconfigured as an at-grade roadway (CLICK).

The study underway now, is the next step toward federal approval and construction.



Pause – So what is the project team trying to accomplish?



This step in the implementation is required by the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA). NEPA requires that a federally funded action or project must to be evaluated on its merits. The evaluation objective is to improve federal funding and action decisions based on planning data and analyses; and upon agency, official and public input.

The Louisiana Department of Transportation and Development and the Federal Highway Administration have determined that the significance of potential impacts is uncertain for this project, so an Environmental Assessment or EA is the appropriate level of study.







The alternatives can be broken down into priority phases for construction as shown here, with the center bridge section having the highest or first priority. Alternatives will initially be evaluated per the purpose and need for the project.

Then, using input from officials, you, and other members of the public the team will consider available environmental and traffic planning data to identify the best alternatives for detailed study.




This graphic illustrates the phasing priority of the project.

As noted, the highest priority, Phase 1 (CLICK) includes an additional bridge over the Inter Harbor Navigational Canal. The new bridge will be adjacent to the existing "blue bridge."


Phase 2 includes (CLICK) improvements to existing Florida Avenue between Elysian Fields and Alvar Street/Poland Avenue. (CLICK) Phase 2 also includes improvements to Tupelo Street.

Phase 3 (CLICK) includes improvements to existing Florida Avenue east of the IHNC in Orleans Parish as well as a new roadway along this alignment in St. Bernard Parish. Current plans show the roadway in St. Bernard Parish will be constructed at-grade and will connect to Paris Road.

Phase 4 (CLICK) includes one of three north/south alternatives that would connect Florida Avenue to St. Claude Avenue/St. Bernard Highway or improvements to Paris Road.




Both a fixed-span and movable bridge designs are being considered for the crossing of the IHNC. The display area contains boards that show what these alternatives would look like. This example typical-section illustrates the cross-section for the fixed bridge alternatives. For safety reasons, bicycle and pedestrian access across the high-level fixed bridge would not be permitted.



The project team is aware of local plans for bicyclists and pedestrians. The New Orleans 2030 Master Plan as well as St. Bernard Parish's 2014 Comprehensive Plan include planned bicycle lanes along Florida Avenue and the Florida Walk Canal respectively.


In keeping with the plans of the local governments and following the LADOTD complete streets guidelines, the proposed Florida Avenue project will implement multiuse pedestrian paths along corridor (CLICK).




As noted, beneficial and adverse effects of the preliminary alternatives on display tonight will be compared to each other. Using public and official input and available technical information, some alternatives and options will be omitted from further considerations; others will be retained for detailed study.



Throughout the environmental assessment process, the project team will be faced with challenges. An important step in resolving these issues is early identification of challenges and seeking government, agency, and public input.




One issue the project team is facing is the railroad crossing at the Norfolk Southern Oliver Yard (CLICK). The Oliver yard is located in Orleans Parish near the intersection of Florida Avenue and Almonaster Ave.



At the Oliver Yard, shown here, Florida Avenue crosses 6 railroad tracks (CLICK). Preliminary estimates show that a car waiting for a train to pass at this location, would be stopped between 4 and 21 minutes.

On average, approximately 62 trains cross Florida Avenue throughout a 24-hour period at this location.


Following data collection, traffic analyses will be conducted to determine design configurations that will operate effectively upon opening and into the future planning horizon of 2040. Using the results of this analysis and other physical constraints identified, the team will configure alternatives to accommodate future needs.



Next, the team will evaluate the effects – both adverse and beneficial – of the retained and refined alternatives. (CLICK)

Analysis on refined alternatives will include wetlands, wildlife and habitat, and endangered species. (CLICK)

Analysis will also consider pedestrian and bicycle facilities, contamination sites, air and noise impacts, and construction.



We have initiated coordination with agencies, officials, and public along with coordinated decisions on project features and collected selected data sets.

Following this meeting, the team will proceed with screening alternatives, followed by detailed traffic, engineering and environmental studies. All of this will be documented in the EA that will be distributed; followed by public hearing and a project decision regarding the selected alternative.





It is my understanding that when this project was initially proposed the route through St. Bernard was to be located north of the Forty Arpent Canal, through the Central Wetlands, as an elevated highway to Paris Road. The current project proposal is a ground level highway that will run through the rear of Arabi Park, St. Claude Heights, Carolyn Park, Buccaneer Villa North and Versailles neighborhoods. This proposal is totally unacceptable to me, and I feel fairly certain, the citizens of St. Bernard Parish.

As an employee of St. Bernard Parish Government, I am privy to several projects the Parish and State have been working on for the past several years to help our community recover from the destruction of Hurricane Katrina. We have made great strides, but we still have much to do. Where we have our greatest number of former Louisiana Land Trust (LLT) lots, we see the opportunity to redevelop those areas into communities that will be better than those destroyed by the storm.

Through hard work and determination, in our Builder Bundle programs, we have solicited and convinced several contractors to begin an extensive rebuilding program in four of the five neighborhoods that would be directly impacted by the LADOTD proposal. This past July and August, we awarded 21 "Builder Bundle" packages, to five (5) contractors, in these very neighborhoods. Each bundle contains five or six lots, totaling 116 lots. One contractor, Lagraize Builders, LLC, in a previous Builder Bundle program,

committed to two bundles of six lots each, in St. Claude Heights, whereby four homes have already been built. The Parish, with the approval of the State Office of Community Development, has allocated \$400,000.00 in CDBG Program Income funds for an advertising program to promote the Parish as a destination to buy a new home and raise a family. The LADOTD proposed ground level Florida Ave. Extension, and the proposed N-S extensions, undermines all of those efforts.

The recently completed Forty Arpent Wetland Observatory lies directly in the path of the ground level proposal. That would be a direct waste of over \$1.5 million dollars of taxpayer monies. The ground level proposal will also destroy the natural habitat and nesting area of an American Bald Eagle located on the Meraux Property between Carolyn Park and Buccaneer Villa North. This is the area we have targeted for a nature park, with nature trails and lagoons. How can we, both the Parish and State officials, justify spending tax payer's monies on our redevelopment program and this proposal before us today, when it is impossible for them to coexist. One, or the other, has to go. I vote for the LADOTD proposal, as a ground level extension south of the Forty Arpent Canal, to die today, so we can move forward with the rebuilding of our Parish.

But foremost, the current LADOTD proposal does not address the efforts and determination of those citizens who returned to their homes after Katrina to rebuild. I am one of those citizens. I will fight this proposal with all of my resources. What do I have to lose? My home? Done that! My Community? Been there! This isn't about the St. Bernard Port, evacuation routes or truck routes. This is about we the people. And you will hear from "We the People."












Following is comment of the Holy Cross Neighborhood Association on the Florida Avenue Project, State Project H005720.

- 1. This project will have significant impact on the Holy Cross Neighborhood, an integral part of the Lower Ninth Ward and its surrounding wetlands.
- 2. Although the project has been planned for a long time and through different eras, the public has for long periods been left out of the planning. After Katrina, required public meetings were cancelled, and the project here was approved without us, much to our community's dismay.
- 3. Because of Katrina the world here has shifted to great work of environmental restoration. A main focus is community connection to wetlands. The access platform over the floodwall at Caffin Avenue above Florida is both symbolic and well utilized. This is a major change in orientation for an entire community that should be reflected in the Florida Bridge/road plan.
- 4. The drawings recently seen October 8, 2016 at St David's School for the Florida Project seem very linear and difficult to comprehend. The project seemed to envision a limited access roadway along a blank wall barrier of railroad tracks and floodwall. But cutting across this linearity is a new lifeline of access to the wetlands for us. We do not want a limited access high speed roadway here. People here might prefer more surface road traffic signal control at major points. Obviously Florida Avenue could be improved but people do not want radical change.
- 5. If improvement is made to existing Florida Avenue you might consider a better standard state road accessible to all and with easy access at grade for streets and to the wetlands. It should be a conduit east and west but also in places north and south. A conventional roadway/modest highway at grade level would be more practical and useful all the way from Elysian Fields to St Bernard Paris Road. The functionality would be broad for many users and not create further concrete and steel barriers and cull-de-sacs in the community and barriers to wetland access.

This would be in synch with the prospect of removing elevated I-10 along North Claiborne Avenue for many of the same reasons, including cost. Not because this is a sure thing but because an improved road like St Claude or N. Claiborne, coming through Lower Nine would be fine for the majority that do not want to see high speed limited access for certain industrial users that acts as a barrier in our neighborhood. It would likely be a welcome option for any and all users by favoring none.

- 6. The connections at Elysian Fields would be in vicinity of the very congested area of the overpass over Florida Avenue Canal and railroad tracks. I-10 is there and I-610 within a very short distance, and neighborhoods, and businesses. Very congested. So a conventional road easily accessed would seem in order here rather than great loops of concrete and steel and large signage. Keep it simple and direct. Keep it usable and affordable for many users, long and short distance trips. If it does not serve the Lower Ninth Ward effectively we do not care to see it built in our neighborhood because it will be a high speed limited access barrier few folks can or will care to use.
- 7. Tupelo St. We believe that the Port of St Bernard's needs for a new roadway should not be the major determinant for the use of Tupelo Street in the Lower Ninth Ward, when there are several more suitable routes in St Bernard Parish that would connect to Florida Avenue, and to

existing Paris Road default route. Tupelo Street may look like a plum on the map but it is in the middle of a recovering close-knit family centered neighborhood where easily accessible short trips are important to people living there. We do not want this street transformed to serve truck traffic, or bring access limitations to connecting streets with limited access roadway concepts. It would be better to route heavy traffic northward in St Bernard where that Port is and where there are drainage canals and government facility (Jackson Barracks) barriers that already block cross-traffic and do not interfere with complex neighborhoods.

- 8. The issue of the high rise bridge seems moot since the MRGO deep draft shipping channel is gone. A new bridge, if built, should be much lower. If opened it should open seldom but quickly to the purpose, even remotely. We prefer double bascule rather than vertical lift span because we have long experienced these in action and prefer the former for speed (actual, not theoretical). The double bascule even partially open will allow passage that a fixed lift span would not.
- 9. The new bridge and its approaches should have minimal visual, noise and other adverse impacts on the adjacent wetlands, including Bayou Bienvenue and the recovering Cypress/Tupelo swamp very close by. This argues for low structures and low speeds. Less is more here.
- 10. We believe that time and effort made on high speed commercial and industrial corridor/ elevated expressway type roads is much more costly and less effective than working with simpler designs that make and keep connections that already exist. Another roadway will be a great asset if it stays elemental and usable and does not seek to serve mainly special users and industries more than the general public.
- 11. The neighborhoods being asked to support this bridge and connecting roadway plan should be afforded plenty of legitimate opportunity to weigh in in ways that are beyond what is allowable under this current deadline after an open house with drawings that were difficult for everyone to follow. We think many good ideas would come from such engagement. This is something we consider part of the project yet to be done before too much else is done. It seems best to get it right the first time by inclusive public collaboration beyond what may be strictly required.
- 12. We want the best outcome here. We will support a plan that makes sense to us, benefits the neighborhood and Lower Ninth Ward, and gains broad community support. We are not fully convinced it should be built, despite the constitutional mandate that was made for us but without us. You would feel the same. We feel it is up to you to provide the plan and the opportunity for public involvement that is necessary to complete this matter suitably.

- went through this same thing, you didn't have as many
- 16 people as you got right now. But it was a small
- 17 contingent of people. And I understand, if my
- 18 information is correct, right now you don't have no
- 19 money to fund the project. Where are they going to get
- 20 the money from? They going to spend money on building
- 21 another bridge? They could use that to do some other
- 22 improvements on the east side.
- 23 Why did they change the reason it was going
- 24 to be one bridge that was going to be six feet lower
- 25 than the Interstate 10 bridge? Now you are coming back

- 1 with a proposal for three or four different types of
- 2 bridges, a permanent bridge, an elevated bridge and one
- 3 that will open up. And then again if you build an
- 4 elevated bridge who going to keep it clean under the
- 5 bridge? If they build this it only going to benefit
- 6 St. Bernard Parish by the time something is going on,
- 7 me and Rev ain't going to be here. Right now you only
- 8 have one exit and one entrance on the roadway, that's
- 9 on Tupelo and I got too many family members from Tupelo
- 10 Street, 2500 block going all the way out to K-Mart, I
- 11 got family members. We helped develop that
- 12 neighborhood back in the 40's when there was nobody
- down there. But they said they ain't going to take no
- 14 land, I don't believe that.
- 15 Then you got a canal that runs down the
- 16 middle, it's not solid land and they built a box on top
- 17 of it and they covered it up.
- 18 I can sit in my house in the morning watching
- 19 the news and when the trucks come down the street and
- 20 it's shaking the house. Then again that concrete that
- 21 they poured on that street was what they called a light
- weight concrete, it wasn't designed for no heavy
- 23 traffic. Basically what I see is it gives them a route
- to come off the bridge, go down Tupelo and get to St.
- 25 Bernard Highway so they get their trucks in the parish.

- 1 They was going to do it on Jean Lafitte Parkway, it was
- 2 going to have an exit off of there, why they discarded
- 3 that? There's no way you are going to see that traffic
- 4 going into St. Bernard Parish until you get to I-510
- 5 and that's Paris Road.

- 10 for this because it does not benefit anybody that lives
- 11 in the lower 9th Ward who does not have to use this
- 12 particular bridge because one, they haven't figured out
- where the drop offs are going to be. So if you live on
- 14 Tupelo Street you are still using, you are still coming
- down Claiborne Avenue or you are coming down St. Claude
- 16 Avenue to get home. Then the issue becomes though once
- 17 you get to Tupelo Street how are you going to even be
- 18 able to get into your home because now they are saying
- 19 that all the through streets that cross Tupelo Street
- 20 right now is not going to come all the way like they do
- 21 now. So I may have to turn off of Claiborne onto
- 22 Tupelo, ride down, make a U-turn, go past my home and
- 23 then come back just to get to my home. And that's
- 24 going to be every time I need to leave my home.
- Then they also have not figured what's going

- 1 to happen to those people should we have to evacuate
- 2 from the lower 9th Ward for any civil disaster that
- 3 might happen because they still haven't figure out
- 4 access to Tupelo Street from the street that cross
- 5 Tupelo Street with this new four lanes that they want
- 6 to build.
- 7 This is just not benefiting anybody who lives
- 8 in the lower 9th Ward to me. It's a big inconvenience.
- 9 And even the gentleman has said if you live on Tupelo
- 10 Street with this plan you are going to be
- inconvenienced every day getting to and from your home
- 12 every day, not might, you are. I'm not for that.

L6	project has not has an opportunity to do is improve
L7	storm water management along the avenues and streets
L8	that are part of the scope so that would include
L9	Tupelo, Florida and other streets part of the St.
20	Bernard scope of work. We deal this issue of storm
21	water management in Orleans Parish and New Orleans and
22	Louisiana so frequently it would be a huge missed
23	opportunity to improve these corridors' ability to deal
24	with that issue with this project. Some examples that
25	I can provide would be looking at studies that the City

Τ	of New Orleans has produced, the Storm water Management
2	study that was produced a couple of years ago, the
3	Resiliency Plan that was developed earlier this year to
4	find options and particular functions that can be added
5	to the streetscape to better absorb storm water when it
6	occurs. Rain gardens and bio swells are two examples
7	of this. I would ask and press that DOTD look at
8	potential partnerships at a City level to make sure
9	that these potential scopes of work are included in
10	this project.
