Abstractor	A person trained to research Court House records to determine the history of the acquisition and other pertinent data of a piece of property by its current owner and previous owners of the same property, for each conveyance for a specified period of time.
Accountant	A person with an accounting or other business related background that manages the financial and business affairs of a company.
Administrative	A person who is given the authority to manage or perform executive duties in place of principal officers.
Appraiser	A person who gives an expert judgement of the value of an item (i.e. property).
Archaeologist	The principal investigator will meet the qualifications for such as published in Louisiana Register on April 20, 1994. Support supervisory archaeological staff will have a minimum of a B.A. or B.S. in anthropology or archaeology from an accredited university.
Architect	A professional architect, licensed to practice by the Louisiana State Board of Architectural Examiners.
Biologist	Will have a B.S. degree in biology or related field from an accredited university and at least two years of experience in wetlands delineation. Current certification by the Corp of Engineers as a Wetlands Delineation Specialist may be accepted in lieu of a specialty degree and the required experience.
Cadd Drafter	A person who draws plans using CADD machines.
Cadd Technician	A person experienced in design and operation of CADD machines.
Chainman	An assistant or training level member of a survey party who holds a leveling rod or prism pole to permit sighting with the surveying instrument.
Clerical	A person performing general clerical duties – typing, filing, data entry, etc. – in support of either the technical or the business activities of a company.
Computer-Analyst	A person who by academic training or professional experience writes computer program and/or system specifications; designs, codes, tests, or modifies computer software applications; and generally analyzes computer systems, networks, and applications.
Driller	A crewmember responsible for the operation of foundation investigation equipment.
Economist	A degreed professional capable of comparative economic evaluations of project alternatives, economic impacts and economic forecasting.
Engineer	A Civil or Environmental professional engineer in the State of Louisiana registered by the State Board of Registers for Professional Engineers and Land Surveyors.
Environmental-Spec. (Envir. Prof.)	Will have a B.A. or B.S. degree from an accredited university in biology, ecology, anthropology, archaeology, historical architecture, planning, environmental studies, or related fields, plus two years of experience in the direct preparation of NEPA documents.
Environmentalist (Envir. Manager)	Will have a B.A. or B.S. degree from an accredited university in engineering, Urban Planning, Environmental Studies, biology, ecology, anthropology, archaeology, historical architecture, planning, environmental studies, or related fields, plus three years of experience in Highway Traffic and Construction Noise Analysis, Mobil Source Pollutant Analysis and familiarity with EPA air quality conformity and congestion management regulations, or the direct preparation of NEPA documents.
Geologist	A degreed professional capable of evaluating geological significance and impacts of proposed project actions.
Historian	A degreed professional capable of researching, evaluating and reporting on the historical significance of a project area and its features.
Inspector-Certified	A person certified by the Louisiana DOTD in the inspection of specific construction materials and/or activities.
Instrument-Man	A journeyman level member of survey party who is trained in use of surveying instruments.
Labor	Unskilled worker, i.e., couriers, file clerks, etc.

Landscape-Architect	A professional landscape architect, licensed by the Louisiana State Horticulture Commission.
Party-Chief	A senior level member of a survey party who plans and directs the activities of the party in conducting engineering and property surveys.
Planner	A degreed professional trained to make or guide transportation planning decisions and their overall community and regional impacts.
Pre-Professional	A person who is 1) a graduate of a recognized engineering school; 2) a person who holds an Engineer-in-Training certificate for a state licensing board; 3) a person who, in fields other than engineering, possesses equivalent qualifications for their respective field.
Principal	Individuals assigned with the legal responsibility for management of the firm. They may be owners, partners, corporate officers, associates, administrators, etc.
Rodman	An assistant or training level member of a survey party who holds a leveling rod or prism pole to permit sighting with the surveying instrument.
Senior-Technician	A senior non-licensed individual who by experience and/or schooling has demonstrated the ability to perform as a specialist in technical details and computation work of a nature not requiring the abilities of licensed personnel.
Supervisor-Arch	A licensed professional architect with a minimum of five (5) years experience in responsible charge of, or major expertise in, the field or fields involved.
Supervisor-Eng	A licensed professional engineer with a minimum of five (5) years experience in responsible charge of, or major expertise in, the field or fields involved.
Supervisor-Other	A professional with a minimum of five years experience in responsible charge of/or major expertise in, the field or fields involved.
Surveyor	A professional land surveyor licensed by the Louisiana State Board of Registration for Professional Engineers and Land Surveyors.
Technician	A non-licensed individual who has demonstrated the ability to perform technical work in a particular field (by experience and/or schooling).
Wetlands-Ecologist	Will have a B.S. degree in biology or related field from an accredited university and at least two years of experience in wetlands delineation. Current certification by the Corp of Engineers as a Wetlands Delineation Specialist may be accepted in lieu of a specialty degree and the required experience.
